Christopher Wren was born in 1631 (or 1632). He was son of Dr. Christopher Wren, Dean of Windsor, and nephew of Matthew Wren, Bishop of Ely.

{In 1664} When Christopher Wren was about thirty-two years of age, he came in contact with John Evelyn, the diarist, who in his journal, under date #13, writes of him as that “miracle of a youth.” The acquaintanceship ripened into a friendship, only broken by Evelyn’s death in 1706. From Evelyn’s diary
